Jews and Christians in Haiti

Last week I spent a few days in Haiti, where my friend Mitch Albom is rebuilding an orphanage. In this broken and dispirited country there are glimmers of goodness, people willing to give time and effort and money to save lives and uplift souls. Traveling around one sees people stuck in tent cities, children wading in fetid pools of water, a market built on rubble. Yet inside the orphanage there are children who once went hungry being fed, clothed, educated, and given promise.

I felt privileged to see Mitch and his friends come from Detroit to save this Christian mission. Each night the children gathered for prayers. While I was there they got new beds and — for the first time in most of their lives — began to eat three meals a day. Some of the stories were remarkable and inspiring.
