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Annual Report: President's Report

As we continue to navigate the latter innings of this pandemic and move toward the endemic phase, I am happy to present this state of the synagogue with you, our Sinai Temple Community.

We are a community rich in history, culture, and inclusion. A synagogue, led by inspirational clergy, that teach and guide us through all of life's cycles. A day school and religious school that nurture our children to become ethical young adults and critical thinkers who can walk through life with confidence and humility. And memorial parks that aim to guide those in times of need, help families plan for the future, and support the Jewish community as well as other worthwhile causes.

At the close of FY20-21, we said 'so long' (not 'goodbye' – a word never used in my wife Sari's family) to our beloved Howard Lesner, and welcomed our new Executive Director, Jessica Green. Jessica has quickly earned the trust and respect of staff, clergy, lay leadership, and the community at large. I have been fortunate to witness, firsthand, her innate ability to translate vision into reality. Jessica has enmeshed herself in the day-to-day business of Sinai Temple with laser-like precision and continues to empower her staff to shift paradigms by creating and implementing innovative and forward-thinking strategies. We have started to forge a path forward to assist us in providing more value to our members and Jessica's leadership has been instrumental in guiding us through that process.

In July 2021, we opened the Sinai Temple Mental Health Center (STMHC). Generously funded by the Fredric D. Rosen and Nadine Schiff Family Foundation, STMHC is the vision of Rabbi Guzik and serves as a resource for congregants in need of emotional or psychological support or outside referrals. The Center offers support groups focusing on specific mental health and relationship issues, a comprehensive bereavement program, and general educational programming throughout the year. We are very thankful to the Rosen's for their continued generosity and for helping provide further support to our community.

The summer of 2021 was supposed to be a "return home". A time when we could see our family, our friends, our community, and be together for the High Holy Days. However, our best-laid plans became untenable as we saw a significant uptick in COVID-19 cases. Just as we planned for an exciting return to in person HHD services, we were forced to make last minute pivots and seek out the assistance of a number of our communal interfaith partners. Rabbis Guzik and Sherman

rallied our friends at the Church of the Good Shepherd and the Mormon Temple and "Yom Kippur: Under the Stars" was borne. Hundreds of families gathered at their baseball field (adjacent to the Mormon Temple) to daven Kol Nidre and Neilah and listen to the long and staccato sounds of the shofar. Due to the Rabbis' leadership and imagination, our members were able to gather and pray together in ways we would have never thought possible. These interfaith relationships are directly responsible for some of our most exciting program successes over the course of this past year. The Purim carnival, Interfaith Prayer Service for Peace in Ukraine, our new Black Jewish Alliance, and Rise Against Hunger were all made possible because of the generosity of our friends, and I look forward to our continued partnership and collaboration for years to come.

Membership suffered a slight decline in FY2020-2021. Fortunately, many of our members returned in FY2021-2022. Our current membership units stand at 1675, including honoraria.

During the latter part of the year, we continued our charge of financial prudence. We identified the need for a purchasing manager to better control our spending, we separated SAA finances (from those of the Temple) in an effort to build trust and accountability, we reassessed our insurance coverage needs, and we adopted better accountability processes. All of these initiatives have resulted in financial savings for Sinai Temple and created the opportunity to offer improved benefits for our employees as well as our institution as a whole. I would like to personally thank our VP Finance, Dr. Leon Biederman, and our Insurance Committee Chair, Michael Akiva, for their leadership and diligence in addressing these issues during this past year.

During this fiscal year we decided that it was no longer possible to ignore some of our outstanding building improvements and deferred maintenance issues. Our VP Administration, Anna Tenenblatt, in collaboration with our Executive Director, guided the Board to approve the most urgent and pressing projects. I am glad to report that we started the process of updating all the perimeter security cameras and we will be upgrading the elevators in short order.

February 20, 2022, we celebrated Aryell Cohen, his legacy, and his 46 years of devotion to this community. It was a night filled with emotion, love, and beautiful music. It was the first night, since the pandemic began in the early spring of 2020, that the main sanctuary was full, honoring a person that Rabbi Wolpe refers to as, "the emotional heart of Sinai Temple." In Aryell's farewell video, he stated that when he enters the main sanctuary, he is consistently awestruck by its grandeur. Truth be told, this community has been graced with Aryell's gifts of music these past five decades and we are the ones that have been filled with awe and amazement. We love you, Aryell, and we thank you!

As many of you know, Rabbi Wolpe announced his pending retirement on June 30, 2023. I feel so very privileged to have had the opportunity to consider Rabbi Wolpe my rabbi, my colleague, and my friend. As he mentioned, he will spend a year in Boston and will assume the role of Rabbi Emeritus beginning July 1, 2023. The board of directors, during 4Q2021, approved a succession plan whereby Rabbis Guzik and Sherman will assume the role(s) of Co-Senior Rabbi. This will be formally presented to the membership once the plan has been crystalized.

At the close of this fiscal year, we will say 'so long' to our current Head of School, Dr. Marc Lindner. Dr. Lindner has been an exceptional leader for our school, and we wish him much luck and success in his future endeavors. Succeeding Dr. Lindner will be Rabbi Andy Feig as Interim Head of School and Lisa Zide as Associate Head of School. We couldn't be happier with their elevation to these new roles, and I hope you will join me in wishing them a B'Hatzalah!

This spring (and early summer), we will continue to embark on some of the initiatives I mentioned previously. From more efficient membership modeling to eTicketing for the High Holy Days, we are leveraging different technologies in order to make the experience of membership at Sinai Temple pleasant and much more efficient. I continue to be excited about the prospects.

I'd like to personally acknowledge the Executive Committee for their tireless commitment to this institution and for their continued resolve. They have done Yeoman's work while maintaining full time careers and sacrificing time with their families. Jamie Berman, Dr. Leon Biederman, Anna Tenenblatt, Richard Weston, Sindy Paikal, Daniel Delshad, Laura Reader, Rob Galperson, Jimmy Taus, Rob Strauss, Rebecca Kekst, Eric Diamond, Shervin Rashti, and Mehrzad Roshan. It has been my honor collaborating with you this past year.

To our esteemed Clergy, it has been my extraordinary privilege to work alongside you building community and creating an environment that adheres to the value of B'tzelem Elohim, that each human being is made in the image of God and that we continue to honor the dignity of our richly diverse community, as illustrated in Sinai Temple's recently adopted Inclusion Statement. Thank you, Rabbis Wolpe, Guzik, Sherman, and Cantor Feldman.

... and Danielle Kassin, our resolute Religious School Director. Danielle spent the past year navigating a lot of emotions and still found a way to offer meaningful and enriching learning experiences to our religious school children and their families. Thank you! Thank you! Our community is truly fortunate.

Finally, thank you, Sinai Temple community, for your support as well as the love you have shown me, Sari, Jeremy, Rylan, and Avery. It has been my pleasure serving all of you this past year.

Annual Report: Development

Development at Sinai Temple continues to be strong, despite the ongoing Pandemic and other challenges. This year, new Director of Development Mike Amerikaner began oversight of our development strategies. He has introduced new ideas – such as highlighting our impact – and is collaborating with lay leadership to improve our development capabilities. Overall, Sinai Temple's members continue to generously support the synagogue during one if its most challenging eras.

Annual Appeal

Like last year, the Annual Appeal continued to be affected by the ongoing Pandemic and it was decided just a few months prior that we would be welcoming members in-person. Therefore, our appeal strategy utilized tactics from last year, such as Text2Give, as well as new tactics, such as having four different pitch speakers in our four different Yom Kippur services. Our appeal's goal was to highlight how the Sinai Temple community came together to support each other during the Pandemic. We highlighted the story of Noah Houriani, who built a Torah tabletop for his offsite Bar Mitzvah, and then shared it with other b'nai mitvah families. The Yom Kippur speakers – Eric Diamond, Noah Houriani, Laura (Reader) Miller, Sam Parsi, and Shervin Rashti shared what Sinai Temple mean to them and their families.

The result was, although Yom Kippur attendance was low, we raised \$1,325,606 from 508 unique donors. While less people gave to Sinai Temple, the average gift size increased to \$2,610. A quickly planned outdoor service raised \$32,488, and our non-resident members continued to support Sinai Temple.

First Time Donors

This year 119 donors made their first donation to Sinai Temple, for a total of \$34,02 and a \$286 average gift. Of those donors, 34 made them during the Annual Appeal (\$7,831 and \$230 average gift). Other gifts were made to various funds, such as the General Fund. First time gifts can indicate that our mission and appeal is resonating with new donors. These new donors are now much more likely to become repeat givers.

Grants

Grants are a vital part of any nonprofit's development portfolio, and this year we were very successful in applying to and being awarded grants, totaling over \$300,000. The largest grant awarded was \$200,000 for a State of California Office of Emergency Service grant to upgrade and improve our security systems. This grant will fund a complete overhaul of Sinai Temple's security camera network. The second largest grant Sinai Temple was awarded this year was from the Los Angeles Jewish Community Foundation: \$50,000 for the Sinai Temple Mental Health Center. This grant is being used to underwrite mental health services and programs for all Sinai Temple staff. Beit Bracha, overseen by Rabbi Nicole Guzik, once again was awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Jewish Federation of Los Angeles. Beit Bracha continues to be one our most important communal services. The Paul Singer Foundation awarded ATID a \$25,000 grant to fund Israel-focused dinners. Finally, Israel Through The Senses program was awarded a \$1,250 grant from Jewish National Fund and Nefesh B'Nefesh.

Special Events

As Sinai Temple continues to bounce back from the Pandemic, we are bringing back special events that support our fundraising efforts. In February, Sinai Temple hosted a farewell concert for Aryell Cohen, our longtime organist. Thanks to the efforts of Cantor Feldman and the committee, the concert raised \$58,075 to our Music Fund. In March, we hosted our first Purim Carnival since 2019, which was organized my Rebeka Small and Danielle Kassin. It was a tremendous success, with thousands in attendance. The carnival raised \$35,560 from ticket and food sales, including \$9,400 in sponsorships. Our postponed Sinai Temple Gala for Jamie and Joel Berman is scheduled for June 12, 2022. The gala for Howard Lesner, also postponed by the pandemic, is being rescheduled TBA 2023.

Major Donors (10k+)

Sinai Temple is fortunate to have generous supporters who can make major gifts. This year is no exception, and these donors continued to support Sinai Temple at a crucial time. As of this report, there were 62 major gifts totaling \$1,348,823. These gifts went to a variety of funds including the Annual Appeal, Clergy Discretionary Funds, and Programs such as the Ted (z"l) & Hedy (z"l) Orden and Family Friday Night Live, and the Sinai Temple Mental Health Center underwritten by the Fredric D. Rosen and Nadine Schiff-Rosen Family Foundation.

Summary

Like most religious institutions and other nonprofit organizations, 2021-2022 proved to be a challenging year as the Pandemic continued. Economic uncertainty and financial hardship

limited many from making more sizeable donations, if any all. Sinai Temple's Annual Appeal, for example, saw less donors give than in years past. However, those that did give generously gave more than last year. In total, Sinai Temple has so far raised \$2,200,933 in both unrestricted and restricted donations. Unrestricted donations totaled \$1,336,420 and restricted donations totaled \$864,513. While we anticipate giving trends to continue in a positive trajectory in 2022-2023, there are a few uncertain factors that may impact next year's development. For example, like most synagogues, Sinai Temple may continue to see a decline in membership. If that were to happen, it is likely we will see another year where there are less donors than the prior year. But if Sinai Temple's donors continue to generously increase their annual contributions, then we will likely continue to reach our fundraising goals.

Beit Bracha is our educational program at Sinai Temple that serves our students with special needs. At its onset, Beit Bracha invited children with special needs and learning differences to meet with a teacher, segregated from the greater religious school student population. At the end of its second year, our parents and students requested a more mainstreamed approach, fully integrating our students with special needs and learning differences within our religious school. Now in its 10th year, the goal of Beit Bracha is for our students to have a positive Jewish educational experience and feel engrained within the fabric of the Sinai Temple community. Our students are paired with aides, methodically matched by our director, Blair Lebovitz and mainstreamed into the classroom, chapel for tefillot, community holiday programming and synagogue wide Shabbatot and events. Beit Bracha is supported by the Los Angeles Jewish Federation, Looking Beyond Next Generation, Sisterhood, Men's Club and private donors.

Additionally, Beit Bracha customizes bnai mitzvah experiences and services for our students with special needs. This past year, Beit Bracha began a formal relationship with Sinai Akiba Academy and was able to support one student with learning differences. While an informal relationship with SAA has been in formation, this is the first year Beit Bracha has played an integral role in assisting a student be more integrated in the classroom, thus cultivating a positive Jewish educational experience. This year, we served 10 families with children with special needs and offered one bar mitzvah experience. One student attended our Religious School Shabbaton with the assistance of an aide through Beit Bracha.

Next year, the goal is to provide Beit Bracha 2.0: a post bnai mitzvah educational and social experience for young adults ages 13+. This is a necessary step to continue offering inclusive space for our population with special needs and learning differences. Our Beit Bracha team looks forward to this next point in the journey at Sinai Temple.

STAFF SUPPORT and MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES: July 2021 – July 2022

1. August 13, 2021

Informal Lunchtime Gathering for Sinai Temple (ST) Staff to address stresses related to returning to work after 1 1/2 years of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

15 participants

All participants had an opportunity to share personal experiences, concerns and hopes. Many lost loved ones and were able to receive support from colleagues. Participants shared concerns about sending children back to school, frustrations with others who have different comfort levels with risk prevention, coping with chronic anxiety. Many shared "silver lining" of enjoying extended time with family and time for personal reflection/growth. Participants shared coping strategies and hope that there will be an adjustment to a "new normal" post-pandemic.

"I felt so relieved knowing I am not the only one that was having issues. I didn't share my thoughts as I got them off my chest, thanks to you, but every single thing that was touched upon, resonated with me completely and was so glad that all shared so much, so freely. I would definitely attend future meetings.

"Hi Carolyn,

Thank you very much for hosting this meeting around Covid re-entry. I would definitely be open to future meetings around this topic. It was nice to hear from other colleagues some of whom are experiencing similar things. Thank you for giving us this space and opportunity. It is so appreciated."

2. August 20, 2021

Presentation/Group Facilitation on Personal Self Care at the Sinai Akiba Academy (SAA) Faculty Orientation Retreat at Brandeis-Bardin Camp Institute

30 participants

Offered in collaboration with the SAA student counseling/clinical staff

Participants introduced themselves with one word about how they are experiencing themselves in this moment of time. Journals and pens handed out and participants had time to respond quietly and privately to writing prompts centered on the Jewish new year: what they want to retain, and what they want to change from last year. Group was gathered for sharing and discussion, much of which centered on experiences during the COVID-19 lockdown. Participants experienced the support of their peers and relief at the opportunity to be heard as individuals, not just as teachers. Session ended with a guided meditation on compassionate mindfulness.

3. August 27, 2021

Upon request of SAA administration based on participant feedback, a follow up self-care session was held at lunchtime for SAA faculty.

Offered in collaboration with the SAA student counseling/clinical staff 5 participants

4. September 2, 2021

Rosh Hashanah Celebration for all Staff of ST and SAA

Over 50 participants

All staff members, including maintenance and security personnel, were invited to relax with a specialty coffee, novelty cookies, and assorted snacks. Gift bags were distributed with a positivity journal, pen, candies, and a scented candle.

5. September 24, 2021

Informal Staff lunch gathering in the ST Sukkah

Participants were engaged with a creative journaling exercise, both for the immediate experience and as a coping tool. Group discussed the impact of the exercise, all felt emotionally calmer and more centered. Session ended with a guided meditation.

6. October 18, 2021

A Special Relaxation Experience with Chaplain Bonnie Leopold, Tibetan Singing Bowls 12 Participants

Participants were invited to lay on blankets and mats for guided Jewish meditation with the sound healing accompaniment of quartz crystal and Tibetan singing bowls.

Sinai Temple Staff Channukah Celebration, invitation extended to SAA Administration Approximately 50 participants for in-person Comedy Performance Coffee Cart, Channukah Gelt, Jelly donuts and other gifts for Sinai Temple Staff Because of COVID protocols and an abundance of caution, this comedy show substituted for the traditional festive lunch. The show was a surprise for staff. The hour included an opportunity to connect briefly with other staff members "to get to know each other better" as friends and colleagues. Feedback shows that staff really appreciated this activity and hope for more chances for real connection in the future.

Emerging from COVID-19

When the budget was planned for the 21-22 school year, much uncertainty remained about COVID-19 and how it might impact class structures and enrollment. The budget was built on the assumption that class structures would not be limited due to COVID-19, as they were in the 20-21 school year. Thankfully, our assumption was correct, and we were able to open school with the full student body attending each day.

While the full student body has been at school throughout the current year, until recently, there were remaining restrictions. Namely, parents were not allowed on campus, we did not have after-school programming, and we were not offering after care. However, in recent weeks (this is being written on 4/8/22), we have opened the campus to parents for a variety of programs and they are entering the building during drop off and pick up times. A sample of the programs that are now occurring in person are:

- Mini Minyan is back! The excitement among parents, students, and faculty is palpable each time!
- ECC Shabbat Celebrations have begun, and parents and students are joyous.
- The CHOICES after school program has begun. Offerings include Young Ninjas, Professor Egghead Science Inventors, Live Animal Invasion, Nature Watch Craft and Cubelets Robocoding, LEGO Engineering, Captain Kicks Soccer, Drone Flight Academy, and Chess.
- Mizmor Shir for several lower school grades.
- Model Sederim for Pesach.
- Publishing celebrations/showcases for several lower grades.
- A very successful and long-awaited Book Fair in Gold Hall.
- 6th grade is going on their trip to Camp Ramah, the 7th grade is going to Washington DC, and the 8th grade is going to Israel!

Leadership Transitions

In the fall, Dr. Lindner announced that he will conclude his tenure as Head of School at the end of the current school year. Rabbi Andy Feig was named Associate Head of School as of January, and he will become Interim Head of School as of July 1. Concurrently, it was announced that Lisa Zide will become Associate Head of School as of July 1. Rabbi Feig and Lisa are fully engaged in planning for the coming school year, with an eye toward growing our overall program and leading it to new heights. A search committee for a permanent Head of School is being formed.

Geoff Agnor announced that he accepted a role as Assistant Head of School at the Willows School in Los Angeles. A search is underway for a new Middle School Director.

Admissions

The Admissions Department works a year in advance to enroll students. It is incredible to look back and recall that one year ago we had not toured any prospects on campus, and all interviews and student assessments were conducted virtually.

Our Community Engagement Committee and Parent Association are providing diverse opportunities for families to connect through grade and community-wide events. In recent months, we have held our first in-person book fair in over two years and have begun to plan for May 2022 Night at the Pier, one of our community's biggest and most popular events of the year. We can't wait!

Our parent body continues to serve as ultimate ambassadors for SAA. In an educational landscape with so many choices, we are poised as a rigorous, academically focused school, rooted in Jewish values and enhanced by a focus on innovation and J-STEAM. We have so much to offer families, and we look forward to welcoming new community members this fall.

We are proud of our healthy enrollment in 2021-22, despite our ever-changing protocols due to COVID-19. As a result, we are pleased to share the following success of the 2021-22 enrollment year:

- 56 of our current parents are alumni, a record!
- **139** new students joined our school
- 90% of our 8th graders got into their first choice High School in the last 5 years
- 8th graders went to **11** high schools across Los Angeles
 - o 5 Top Secular Independent; 4 Jewish; 2 Public
- Enrollment increased by 21%
- Enrollment exceeded our goal by 6.7%
- Increased number of families to 373

As we settle into a "new normal" post-COVID-19, we are excited about what is to come at SAA!

Development

Despite many challenges, we have had several significant gifts made to the school through different major gifts and we anticipate surpassing our fundraising projections. As of 4/7/22, approximately \$700,000 was raised and we project that we will be close to \$800,000 before June 30th. This will exceed our budgeted projection which was \$734,926. Details are:

- Sinai Akiba Fund \$350,326 (our budget goal was \$350,000, and there's still time to raise more.)
- Endowment Donations \$55,500 (not projected since it is not Operating Income.)
- Major Gifts for 21-22 School Year \$180,000 has been raised in major gifts, and we had projected \$70,000 in our Budget projections. This will help to make up a significant amount of the \$125,000 we had hoped to net for the 2021-22 Annual Event which we did not hold this year due to COVID. Gifts were made in support of our Israel Trip, Innovation Lab and Orchestra and a \$50,000 gift yet to be designated.
- Grants (TA, BJE, Federation & Milken) \$116,633 YTD (with an additional \$43,000 expected from the Federation, \$11,438 from the BJE for Lainer/Generations yearly grant and \$8,400 from the Milken Family Foundation. This will bring this number up and these figures were in our original projections.
- SM Night at the Pier ~ \$57,000 in Sponsorships raised so far and another \$16,000 in ticket sales. The Event runs approximately \$100,000 and we hope to exceed our goal with additional funds raised in support of Sinai Akiba. Everyone is very excited, and our Parents Association is delighted to bring this event back after a two year hiatus. Our students love this special evening, and it is great to have something in the works that will bring our community together.

 - Students created their own mini-shuls and shared them with their classmates, teachers, parents and even came on Shabbat morning to display to the entire Sinai Community.
- 2nd Grade
 - Learned about the Shuk in Israel; and then created and ran their own Shuk with students and parents as their "customers". They learned the Hebrew words for many of the items in the Shuk and raised almost \$300 for a charity in Israel!
- 3rd Grade
 - For the first time did a siddur project, learning about the prayers in the siddur and the connections with their grandparents and our ancestors.
- 5th Grade
 - Created and prepared Shabbat dinner for their parents.
- 6th Grade
 - Kabbalat Shabbat and Seder bootcamp (pre seder)!
- 7th Grade
 - o Israel History with Israel link curriculum and Holocaust studies dual curriculum

Challenges of 2021/2022 include:

1. Covid Testing created enormous amount of administrative work.

- 2. Families were upset about mask wearing or and other families were upset about the lack of mask wearing.
- Not knowing about what ages would need to be vaxxed to go to school. The anger and frustration around this took a lot of time and care and many hours of listening to frustrated parents.
- 4. Difficult to project /predict budget, hiring staff and guide families for upcoming school year.
- 5. Being short staffed; not having a Rabbi assigned to religious school has impacted us greatly.
- 6. There were positions unfulfilled within the temple that impacted the day-to-day administrative operations of our office (i.e.: Human Resources, Membership team, Technology Director, Mail/Copy Staff, et.)
- 7. In addition, our office assumed more responsibilities in relation to finance and membership.
- 8. Planning for a year continued of unknowns.

We are proud of all the accomplishments and successes we have been able to achieve during this unprecedented year.

Metrics:

We have a total of 301 students. We had 72 new students and 18 completely new families to the temple.

Goals

- 1. To continue to find ways to be in touch with individual families on a regular basis.
- 2. To continue to provide tutoring and individual support for students to enhance their Hebrew skills
- 3. To continue to reflect on our curriculum and creating ways to be relevant to our community and our students
- 4. To give support to our teachers to retain them.
- 5. To keep our families connected with Sinai Temple so that they continue to see the value in sending their kids and being a part of Sinai Temple.
- 6. Due to a generous gift from the Wachtels, we already secured a Shinshinit to support and enhance our Israel education in the Religious School and at Sinai for the coming school year.
- 7. Continue to rebuild our community to be even stronger and more connected than before.



Annual Report: Finance

Submitted By: Leon Biederman, Vice President of Finance Sinai Temple's Finances as of June 30, 2021

The following highlights are from the audited financial statements of Sinai Temple as of June 30, 2021. All Sinai Temple numbers include the combined results from our three main divisions: Sinai Temple ("ST"), Sinai Akiba Academy ("SAA") and Mt. Sinai Memorial Parks and Mortuaries ("MSMP") unless specified otherwise. Additionally, we have included results from our compiled (unaudited) financial statements as of December 31, 2021. All dollars are rounded to the nearest thousand.

- The Net Assets of Sinai Temple increased \$20,229,858 or 19% as of June 30, 2021 from the previous year.
- The Total Revenues of Sinai Temple, including MSMP, were \$47,666,338 as of June 30, 2021, which represented a 2% decrease over the previous year. Of the Total Revenues, ST contributed 20%, SAA contributed 23%, and MSMP contributed 56% (1% listed as "With donor restrictions" division not specified).
- Membership dues and related charges made up approximately \$4,925,144 or 51% of the Total Revenues of Sinai Temple, excluding SAA and MSMP, as of June 30, 2021.
- Contributions totaled approximately \$3,895,720 or 40% of the Total Revenues of Sinai Temple, excluding SAA and MSMP, as of June 30, 2021. This is up from 39% of Total Revenues from the previous year.
- Special Programs, special events and other income, made up approximately \$873,599 or 9% of the Total Revenues of Sinai Temple, excluding SAA and MSMP, as of June 30, 2021.
- Salaries, benefits and related expenses comprise approximately \$5,253,546 or 52% of the Total Expenses of Sinai Temple, excluding SAA and MSMP.
- There was a cash surplus of \$4,468,358 (Temple Main Operating Bank) as of June 30,2021.
- Sinai Temple has an unsecured revolving line of credit from a commercial bank that has a zero balance of June 30,2021.
- In October 2013, Sinai Temple obtained a loan of \$1,350,000 to fund the ECC Remodel Project. The Temple also opened a line of credit to cover the monthly interest expense on this loan. As of June 30, 2021, the loan balances of these lines of credit is zero.

• Sinai Temple obtained a loan from a private foundation for purchase and installation of the Yahrzeit Boards located in the main sanctuary. The balance owed as of June 30, 2021was \$105,001. Quarterly principal and interest payments are based on the number of plaques sold in each quarter.

Thank you to Kay Mauren, Director of Finance, and the entire staff of the Finance Department for their outstanding efforts in preparing and maintaining the financial records of Sinai Temple.

Annual Report: Membership

The Membership Committee is charged with overseeing all Sinai Temple activities that directly impact our mission to recruit and retain members. The extraordinary array of activities for which Sinai Temple is known was impacted, as everything else, by the Covid closures. We went online for services, programs and classes, and as we thankfully have re-opened our doors to inperson gatherings, our activities have ramped up and are described here, covering every demographic and age group—Atid, Dor Chadash, Sisterhood, and Men's Club. We suffered some resignations due to Covid, but we are happy to report that many of the people who resigned have re-joined, and we look forward to having more members join. We instituted a Virtual Friends of Sinai category for people who live more than 30 miles away from Sinai, so they can have some benefits while participating virtually in our programs and services.

Mid-year, there was some re-structuring in lay leadership and staff. Rob Galperson, VP Membership for the first half of the fiscal year became VP Education and Mehrzad Roshan became the current VP Membership. Membership Director, Jordan Bleiweiss, resigned and we are undergoing a search for a new Director that will focus on membership engagement, retention and recruitment, and will work with the Database Team on handling the data portion.

Membership Committee Structure

The Membership Committee is composed of 22 members, representing various segments of the congregation and meets once a month. Member names are listed at the end of this report. The current team, composed of Mehrzad Roshan, Membership VP, Rosa Berman Ruder and Jason Cosgrove, Membership Committee Co-Chairs, and Rabbi Erez Sherman, forms a steering committee and meets every two weeks. In partnership with the members of the committee, we come up with new ideas and implement them over the course of the year.

Membership Committee Goals

- 1. Increase our engagement of members
- 2. Better serve the needs of our members
- 3. Increase the value of membership
- 4. Attract and retain new members

Membership Engagement Activities

To achieve these goals, to create a warm and welcoming community, to welcome new members to our community, to foster a deeper relationship among clergy and our members, and to engage our members in the life of Sinai temple, we have hosted, sponsored and organized several events which are quite diverse and shows our efforts to reach out to the entire congregation. Here's a list of the events that took place this fiscal year:

- *Dor Chadash Shabbat In The Park--hundreds of attendees per event enjoy food, games and services to welcome the Sabbath on Friday afternoon once a month.
- *Dor Chadash Tot Shabbat With Jason Mesches-every 2 months. Jason Mesches does a rock Shabbat on Pilot Plaza for our ECC.
- *SAA-Family Minyan Shabbats-once a month, 100 attendees pray and eat lunch together.
- *Black Jewish Alliance-Partnering Programs with Faithful Central Bible Church to bridge neighbors.
- *Purim Carnival-over 1000 attendees held at the Good Shepherd School on Sunday March 6, 2022.
- *Havdalah--100 attendees at St Paul the Apostle's outdoor space.
- *Ted z'l and Hedy Orden z'l Friday Night Live—sold-out dinners of 200 young professionals each month with a service for 300.
- *Introduction to Judaism-class of 20, meeting in person at Sinai Temple, as students learn about Judaism and Sinai Temple.
- *Sinai Dad's Learning--bi-monthly, a group of 20-30 dads gather at a home to learn Torah and discuss modern issues with Rabbi Sherman.
- *A Woman's Perspective Class and Kabbalah Class with Rabbi Guzik—over 30 attendees at each class.
- *Rabbinic visits in ECC-for each holiday and Shabbat, Sinai Temple clergy visit the classrooms (in person!) to teach about the upcoming holiday.
- *Ukrainian Interfaith Prayer Service-our community gathered at Sinai Temple with over 20 faith organizations from our neighborhood: 300 in attendance and thousands online.
- *Sushi Shabbat-April 29th open to all members service led by Duvid Swirsky.
- *New Members Shabbat-100 attended on March 4, many new members included.

- *Family Minyan Purim Party-over 300 attendees on the Sinai Temple rooftop made sandwiches for the homeless, ate dinner, and read the Megilla.
- *Passover Seder at Sherman/Guzik Home-2nd night seder for 60 people hosted at the Rabbis home for those who need a place to go.
- *Basketball leagues—these will be starting in April as our gyms open up.
- *Sinai Temple Basketball Camp—5 weeks of camp that will bring in \$25,000 this summer.
- *Concert honoring Organist and Choir Director Aryell Cohen on February 20, with Cantors Marcus Feldman, Meir Finkelstein, Arianne Brown, David Silverstein and Jeremy Lipton. Several hundred people attended in person at Sinai and many more watched online.
- *Passover Booklet 2022—The Temple solicited recipes from our members. Many submitted recipes along with stories and memories of Passover celebrations. The Booklet was distributed to our members via email.
- *Rabbi Sherman sends an email to each member on his or her birthday, thus extending warmth and acknowledgment to our members, who respond in kind with words of gratitude and updates on their own families and their life.

Empty Nesters: For members who have a child between 18 and 39 (and who may have other children outside this range). Randi and Jerome Greenberg and Farideh and Farshad Rafii cochair this group and coordinate interesting events: dinner at a kosher restaurant on Pico in March attended by 20 members and a bagel brunch at a private home planned for May 15 with a beekeeper who will talk about harvesting honey and providing some to take home. On June 26, there will be a performance at Sinai by The Braid (formerly Jewish Women's Theatre).

Greeters and Bimah Committees

Greeters have a unique opportunity every Shabbat to interact with our congregants and show them what a warm and welcoming community Sinai Temple is. The bimah committee recognizes and honors members and leaders of the temple by inviting them on the bimah on a rotating basis every Shabbat. Richard Weston coordinates our members to sit on the bimah and Michael Silberstein is chair of the greeting committee. Michael welcomes everyone with love and a warm smile. I would like to recognize and thank Mansoor Eslamboly who is greeting every Shabbat and on HHD. Mansoor has been a member of our temple for over 34 years and has been a dedicated greeter for most of those years.

Mental Health Center. In furtherance of our Membership goals of serving the needs of our members and increasing the value of membership, Sinai inaugurated this year its Mental Health Center, generously underwritten by the Fredric D. Rosen and Nadine Schiff-Rosen Family Foundation. Rabbi Nicole Guzik was instrumental in creating this Center, and she explains its

function and programs in a separate report. Carolyn Hoffman, LCSW, is the Director of the Center.

Membership Retention. Number of membership units as of December 2021 was 1,435 paid (1,620 total), compared to 1,383 paid (1514 total) in 2020-21.

Dues Structure. The Sinai Temple dues structure is very complex, and we are in the process of simplifying the structure. A subcommittee composed of Farideh Rafii and Kerry Maller did extensive research on dues structures of other synagogues in the area. Andre Lev proposed a model. Executive Director Jessica Green embarked on a systematic review and analysis of the existing data and is working on re-structuring the membership dues and a new approach for seat reservations, including issuing electronic High Holy Day tickets.

CONCLUSION

As the impact of the Covid virus diminishes, we hope that more people will feel comfortable gathering again at Sinai for services, classes and programs. We are willing and ready to provide opportunities for our members to engage with each other at Sinai. I want to thank our dedicated clergy and our President for their support and guidance, and Rabbi Sherman for his extraordinary efforts and enthusiasm in connecting with members and building relationships, especially with young families and young professionals.

Annual Report: Ritual

The VP of Ritual oversees all of Sinai Temple's ritual matters. Committees in the VP's portfolio are B'nai Mitzvah, Bikkur Cholim, Ritual, Shiva and Tahara.

The coronavirus pandemic led the synagogue to close its doors for meetings, programs and classes for most of 2020 and much of 2021. In response, the clergy, staff, and lay leaders used a hybrid format of online and in-person programing to provide services, including outdoors venues, to maintain an ongoing connection with our members. Sinai adapted quickly to spikes of Covid infections and for both Shabbat and Holiday services followed the guidance of local health authorities and its own physician advisory committee. Services were streamed online so that people who were not able to attend in person were nevertheless able to benefit from our services and our clergy. We are grateful to our dedicated clergy, lay leaders and hardworking staff for facilitating a virtual connection with Sinai whenever possible. Sinai has since reopened its doors for in-person services, which continue to be streamed so that people who are not yet able to attend may participate.

High Holy Day services 5782

Main Sanctuary. Services led by Rabbi David Wolpe and Cantor Marcus Feldman were held in person and were also streamed via audio and video equipment installed last year. Despite all the challenges due to ever-evolving Covid protocols, the services went very smoothly and were inspirational and uplifting. The clergy did a great job finding people to do Torah readings and chanting prayers, and connected with the congregation through sermons and music, with the able assistance of lay ushers and greeters.

Barad Hall services led by Rabbi Brad Artson and Cantorial Intern David Childs were held in person only. The services were beautiful as always. Although attendance was lower than in prior years due to Covid protocols for unvaccinated children, whose absence was felt, the members that did attend were happy to be there, and the services were warm and heimish.

Outdoor Services. Under the leadership of Rabbis Erez Sherman and Nicole Guzik, all members were invited to an outdoor service for Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints' baseball field, attracting over 1,000 participants of all ages who felt more comfortable in a completely outdoor service. These special High Holy Day services

accommodated those who otherwise would have been unable to attend our in-person services due to Covid restrictions at that time preventing unvaccinated children from entering our building.

Family Minyan services led by Rabbi Sherman were held in person in Kohn Chapel on Rosh Hashanah day 1 and in Gold Hall on RH Day 2. Family Minyan also offered a service in Kohn Chapel on Yom Kippur, with the help of Rabbinic intern Kevin Lefkowitz and Jay Harwitt. Torah in the Round services led by Rabbi Guzik were held in person in Gold Hall on RH Day 1 and then combined with the Main Sanctuary on RH Day 2. Services in both Kohn Chapel and Gold Hall were also streamed. Young professional Atid members were invited to attend all services with unreserved seating, and Dor Chadash was offered online programming previously recorded by Rabbis Guzik and Sherman.

Religious Services

Daily Minyan Services this year continues to be hybrid, both in person and streamed. While inperson services still have low participation, we have been able to constitute a minyan. When the time changed for daylight savings in the Fall, in addition to in-person services, Rabbi Rosenthal instituted the practice of taping the Kabbalat Shabbat Service ahead of time and included the Yahrzeit and Shiva names for that day. Regular attendees and invited guests attend Daily Minyan to observe a Yahrzeit, Shiva, or B'nai Mitzvah. The return of in-person Daily Minyan services has allowed our members to lead the service on their regular days as they did before the pandemic closure.

Our synagogue offers weekly Shabbat Services, B'nai Mitzvah Ceremonies and Dor Chadash Shabbat programs. We also offer once a month STARS Shabbat service for Religious School, the Ted (z"I) & Hedy (z"I) Orden & Family Friday Night Live, and the Feit Family Shabbat Live. These services are offered in person and are also streamed. We are thankful to Roy Regev and Gary Fayman for their very competent technical support, and we thank Jorge Garcia for his many years of service as AV staff and wish him well in his new position with the Los Angeles Unified School District.

Torah at the Table class

This class started many years ago at Sinai Temple when a group of members sought to delve deeper into the Torah portion of the week. At 9:30 AM on Shabbat mornings a group of devoted members would travel from the Main Sanctuary to the library on the third floor to engage in discussion, armed with materials to share, and would return to the Sanctuary in time for Musaf and the Rabbi's sermon. Norman Pell, z'l, led the group for many years, followed by Dr. Malcolm Cosgrove, who recently passed the gavel to Judge Norman Tarle. The class is lay led, and different persons take turns in leading the session every week. The class went on zoom during Covid and is now hybrid, with some people at Sinai and others on zoom, including some from out of state and from around the world.

Youth activities report by Cantor Feldman

- 1. The Sinai Temple Youth Choir, consisting of 3rd to 6th graders from Sinai Akiba Academy and the Sinai Religious School, actively participates in Shabbat morning services. They appeared virtually during the pandemic but are now meeting in person for rehearsals with Cantor Feldman on Wednesday afternoons in Pilot Plaza and will appear in person to lead some of the prayers in the Main Sanctuary one Shabbat a month. The Youth Choir participated in the Kabbalat Shabbat service on March 4 to welcome new Temple members and provided a lot of ruach.
- 2. Post B'nai Mitzvah students. Cantor Feldman is reaching out to students who have led prayers and Torah readings in the past to encourage them to read Torah during Shabbat services.
- <u>3.</u> <u>Junior Cantors</u>. The cantor is working individually with post-Youth Choir age children to have them participate in services.
- 4. One-year anniversary of B'nai Mitzvah. The cantor is inviting these children whose families are still members to have an aliya or Torah reading on the first anniversary of their B'nai Mitzvah.

Web Parashah

A subcommittee of the Ritual Committee is engaged in the process of updating the Web Parashah App. This app allows Sinai members to sign up to read Torah and Haftorah on Shabbat and Holidays. Cantor Feldman uses this APP to send messages to members with available dates to read. The Cantor also contacts post B'nai Mitzvah students to mark the anniversary of their B'nai Mitzvah by reading or having an Aliyah, as mentioned in 2 and 4 above.

Other services/musical programs

- 1. <u>Special Shabbat Service.</u> April 25, 2022 is the last Shabbat with Aryell Cohen as Organist, and there will be a special service that day.
- 2. <u>Fast of the First-Born services</u> will take place on Friday morning April 15 in person at Sinai. Passover begins that same day in the evening.
- 3. Concert in honor of Aryell Cohen. The Temple had a wonderful concert on February 20, 2022, celebrating Aryell Cohen's 46 years of service to Sinai Temple as Organist & Choir Director. The concert featured cantors and choir members that worked together with Aryell over the course of his career. You can view this wonderful event online by following this

Bikkur Cholim

The **Bikkur Cholim Committee** is an integral part of our caring community and is chaired by Angela Maddahi. The committee receives information from the clergy and fellow Sinai Temple members about members of our community who are lonely and/or ill. We reach out to them to see if we can help in any way or just provide companionship. We also send them get well cards and other encouraging notes, and from time to time we set up a meal train. We hope in the near future to be able to set up in-person hospital and home visits once again, which had to be suspended during the pandemic. The committee has not met in person due to Covid, but intends to do so later this year.

B'nai Mitzvah

The **B'nai Mitzvah Committee** reviews B'nai Mitzvah eligibility for students with special circumstances. This committee was chaired by Ellie Pourbaba for many years, and we thank her for her dedicated service. Sam Parsi has now taken on the leadership of this important committee and continues the tradition of assisting families with this very special occasion. In 2020 and 2021 respectively we had approximately 72 and 87 B'nai Mitzvah ceremonies. In 2022 so far we have approximately 83 B'nai Mitzvah dates on the calendar.

Ritual

This year, among other things, the **Ritual committee** has focused on enhancing knowledge of Jewish rituals. The Ritual Committee sponsored a Passover Recipe Exchange program, which allowed Temple members to connect and share a piece of family history through favorite Passover recipes. The recipes were gathered in a Virtual Booklet by Adina Miller Winnett, along with "A Journey into the Festival of Pesah" compiled by Rosa Berman Ruder, which provides information about Passover rituals and traditions that can be used as points of discussion at the seder.

Shiva

The **Shiva Committee** is headed by Estelle Marco, and she has reached out to families who request support. The **Taharah Committee** was not active due to the coronavirus pandemic.

<u>Information Technology System Committee</u> - has oversight responsibilities concerning the role of technology in supporting the mission of Sinai Temple and its schools.

Top Achievements for the Communications Committee:

 Upgrading our video and audio experience: Integrating live audio mixing tools and an online platform for creating on the fly edited videos and audio. Necessary for our social media platform and new podcast channels.

- Hired a new AV Coordinator: with experience in the digital audio and visual realm, while helping ST with online content and video editing. Hopefully, can reduce our needs for audio vendors soon.
- Perfecting our live broadcast experience: audio mixing for in-house and broadcast, three different monitor setups (Bima, audience, home view), special light configuration and additional cameras. Typical Weekends: Ted (z"l) & Hedy (z"l) Orden and Family Friday Night Live, 2 Bar Mitzvahs, Sisterhood Shabbat.
- Bar Mitzvah Family video system: defined process cross-functionally to make departments are working together to manage this video product and allow for some revenue generation to help cover costs of production.
- Website Upgrade:
 - Conducted a survey across the entire Temple membership, Executive
 Committee, and staff to properly assess our current website and to help us define the future needs for the website.
 - Prioritized feedback and changes into a requirements doc to be provided to potential web firms to provide proposal to update the website.

Top Achievements for the Technology Committee:

- Hiring of Michael Wacht as technology consultant to help us streamline and execute all technology projects on time and on budget.
- Full Inventory and Invoice review from the past year
 - Received over \$21k in credits due to billing mistakes / pushback on Project Time billed by Vendor.
 - Reduced monthly cost by ~\$2k due to removal of extra computers from management, Executive Director's initiative to enforce 1:1 computer per employee compliance.
- Current Server Situation
 - Down to 2 servers, mostly to support EMS Event Management Software
 - New EMS Cloud Based software approved, project will take another 8 weeks to complete, and then the rest of the servers will be removed.
- Consolidated Phone Billing
 - We consolidated all the phone bills into a single bill, and reduced the cost permonth.
- Managing IT Vendor, making sure they are delivering services correctly and correcting mistakes.
- Updated HR onboarding processes for new / terminated employees with PBO and Integritek so that things are not missed.
- Streamlining the Finance software and payment workflow with Leon (still work in process).
- Dynamix VOIP Provider
 - The system was broken due to poor internal management. Calls were being misrouted. Voice response menus were outdated / not working. Call timeframes were broken.

- Working with Dynamix to fix issues, re-setup call flow and create new instruction guides for how to modify system so that Sinai Temple has a written guide for common functions in the system.
- Continuing to work on open projects / improvements to the IT systems and workflows
- SharePoint and Microsoft Teams training better internal communication and storage of shared files so that data isn't siloed anymore. There was a roadblock in the past where people would store things locally and when they went on vacation / got terminated, files got lost.
- Group and Security Structure Cleanup Jessica performed a miracle by getting
 everyone together in a meeting to finally hash out who needs access to what, so
 we could remove a lot of dead files and unused groups. As well as access for
 people who shouldn't have it.

Top achievements of 2020- 2021 include:

The Contracts Committee has been deeply involved in negotiating and preparing contracts for clergy as well as with some administrators in Sinai Akiba and the Religious School. Our Bylaws committee has been active in updating our Bylaws, including modifications to accommodate special circumstances during the Pandemic. The legal committee was key in working with administration and outside counsel concerning threatened legal action against the School and Temple and defeating any such claims before they could even be filed. COVID and COVID related issues were a major element of work done by the committees under the General Counsel.

In addition, various members of the legal committee have provided an ad hoc basis counseling to the General Counsel on a number of legal issues as they occur.

The General Counsel reviews all contracts between Sinai and/or SAA and third parties to insure that our interests are protected.



Annual Report: Atid

We welcomed 2021 on an optimistic yet cautious foot. Determined to reconnect in-person and re-build the Atid community, young professionals rallied together to help our senior members get immunized. With the partnership of Debra Eisen and the Sisterhood Vaccination Project, several young adults eagerly stepped up to personally call 250+ Sinai members to secure vaccination appointments.

January through June, Atid opted for virtual events, as vaccines slowly rolled out for young adults. To celebrate Passover, we enlisted Sinai Temple member and SAA alum Henry Platt and NY Times best-selling cookbook author Jake Cohen for an intimate 40 person Zoom. From their personal kitchens, Jake Cohen and Henry walked through the recipe for Passover Macaroon Brownies, while chatting about family traditions, favorite bagel toppings, and more. Capitalizing on our Zoom event success, Atid brought in Logan Ury, a Harvard-educated behavioral scientist-turned-dating coach at Hinge and author. Logan and Rabbi Wolpe discussed her new book *How to Not Die Alone* and navigating modern dating as a young Jewish professional (especially in a pandemic). This event generated over 250 sign ups and was streamed on Facebook and BoxCast. Participants gave feedback that the program inspired dating with intention and prioritizing their love life, despite the uncertain times we were experiencing.

A few months and doses of Pfizer and Moderna later, we were thrilled to gather face-to-face and kick off in-person events! In true Atid fashion, we launched with a revamped version of The Ted (z"I) & Hedy (z"I) Orden and Family Friday Night Live, hosted outdoors under string lights on Pilot Plaza. With a new 5-piece band, led by Duvid Swirsky, a delicious Kosher spread, and nearly 100 people, this was the first of 9 subsequent packed Ted (z"I) & Hedy (z"I) Orden Family Friday Night Lives to follow. Other notable highlights from these *Shabbatot* include: a Thanksgiving feast, Journalist Danielle Robay, Life-coach Kevin Nahai, a new tradition of stumping the band, delicious food offerings, thoughtful opportunities to schmooze and mingle, revitalizing outdoor spaces at Sinai Temple, and by the end of March, over a 65% rate of repeat participants with over 120 attendees each month.

Word spread quickly that Atid was back in person, and we wasted no time capitalizing on our momentum. In July, we planned a summer outdoor happy hour at an ideal West LA venue. Our crowd, consisting of around 150 people, spilled over our reserved tables, taking over the entire 4,000 square foot patio, and we closed the place down. The timing of this happy hour was perfectly positioned to promote Sinai's discounted young membership rates and High Holy Day

offerings. Hanukkah quickly approached, bringing us together at Bob's at The Farmer's Market for "Java and Jelly Donuts," which was recognized by JLiving magazine.

Other notable successes in 2022 thus far include:

- 2 in-person cohorts (consisting of about 15 participants each) of Fuel For Truth, a six-week Israel education course for young professionals. This JNF program covers the modern history of Israel, major issues surrounding the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and the best practices for effectively discussing these topics in the real world. Atid, JNF and JNFutures have a deeply valued partnership that we are thrilled to continue through Happy Hours, Israel education classes, and more.
- Guest speaker Rudy Rochman, Jewish-Israel Rights Activist, in conversation with Tabby Refael, author at Jewish Journal, in partnership with StandWithUs' young professional network. Atid hosted this event in Kohn chapel with nearly 100 young adults.
- Hamantaschen Baking with 60 Atid women and Samantha Weiner, MFT, Founder of Wellness by Samantha, and Sinai Temple member at the home of Rabbis Guzik and Sherman.
- Dance with Robyn Rapaport, Book Club with Sarah Gitman and Yoga with Becky Blitz are part of continuous programming for our Atid community. These offerings are led with intention by the next generation of life-long Sinai Temple families – always supported by Andrea Stern as well.
- Inaugural Black Jewish Alliance dinner in partnership with the Faithful Center Baptist Church hosted at Sinai Temple with Rabbi David Wolpe and Rabbi Erez Sherman in attendance.
- Partnership with the Sinai Social Action Committee for an evening of "Packing with Purpose," packing hygiene and food bags for UCLA's Food Closet. Atid has formed a new partnership with the SAC and has a representative on the committee, Dana Schmidt.
- A sold-out Atid/Sinai Temple Second Night Seder at the home of Rabbis Guzik and Sherman with 60+ individuals (ranging in age from 20-90).
- The creation of a young couple's network and chavurah program.
- Increased Facebook, YouTube and social media presence, engagement and interactions.
 Atid's Instagram following has increased 44% from 422 to 750. Between the months of May and March, Atid's Facebook metrics indicate a 277% increase in reach (18,392 new reaches).

As we continue to grow our listserv of over 5,000 young adults, especially through the
offering of new events that attract first-time attendees and partnering with other YP
Jewish organizations, the Atid newsletter open rate reached higher than ever-before at
about 40%!

With the Atid flood gates now wide open and several young adults running through, we feel a sense of renewed *ruach*, excitement, contagious warmth, and an impressive, diverse and inclusive community. We look forward to creating a leadership committee of our core participants, re-launching our Sinai Basketball Association league with revenue-generating fees, garnering more young Sinai Temple members, and partnering with other groups in the synagogue, while always continuing to lead with "the why" behind each and everything we do.

The Atid department feels very grateful for the guidance and support of Rabbis Guzik and Sherman, Jessica Green, The Men's Club, the SAC, and the Membership Committee.

The Sinai Temple Sisterhood mission is to empower a diverse group of women of varying ages to observe and promote Jewish values and traditions, and enjoy warmth and friendship in the process. While enriching our lives through our many activities, we support Sinai Temple, Conservative Judaism and the greater community through our social action programs and fundraising efforts. We value the energy, ideas and participation that our members bring. This mission is enacted by our Executive Committee and Board of Directors, with the help of many on various committees.

2021 saw a slight increase in our ability to come together due to the availability of COVID vaccines and boosters, along with periodic waning in the number of cases of the virus. All of our monthly meetings were hybrid -- both in person and on Zoom. Our monthly Rosh Hodesh gatherings began in person and then moved to Zoom as of the beginning of 2022. We're making a roaring comeback with our Chay Ay Olam recipient being Rabbi David Wolpe! Torah Fund is the main fundraising vehicle for the Women's League of Conservative Judaism, with which our Sisterhood is affiliated. These funds are used to support the five Conservative/Masorti seminaries worldwide, providing scholarships to the students enrolled.

The main focus of Sisterhood's fundraising is for Sinai Temple and its two schools. We accomplish that through Sisterhood Catering, which provides delicious and beautiful spreads for B'nei Mitzvahs, weddings, and new baby celebrations. In addition, our Judaica Shop provides beautiful candlesticks, Kiddush cups, tallitot and more. Due to the pandemic, our

ability to raise funds has been drastically reduced. We have done very few catering events, opened our gift shop by appointment only, and taken our education classes online only. Unaffected by the pandemic was our High Holiday Greeting Cards and Honey Sales, which both did very well.

The health crisis will continue to dictate when and how we can come together as a group, and we will endeavor to offer new and innovative educational, spiritual, social action and social programming to meet our mission.

The mission of the Sinai Temple Board of Governors (BOG) is to independently review and discuss the issues and policies of importance to Sinai Temple, and support our leaders, clergy, staff, members, our President and the Sinai Board of Directors (BOD) to develop, host and sponsor religious and cultural activities consistent with Sinai's mission and all special projects as directed by the Sinai Temple President.

The BOG was established in1973 to provide a forum to discuss synagogue policy and programs; and to advise the Temple president and BOD. It was envisioned to tap the talent and experience of former BOD members and congregational leaders not currently serving on the BOD, to offer their time, suggestions and good counsel.

Members are elected by the BOD as recommended by the BOG co-chairs. Temple members of at least 3 years who are also past members of the BOD are eligible. All Past Temple presidents also serve on the BOG.

Mount Sinai Mortuaries and Memorial Parks Annual Report to the Sinai Temple Membership

Last year I wrote at length regarding the impact of COVID-19. While, sadly, we continue to handle COVID-19 cases, thankfully they are relatively few in number. We continue to provide these families with the support and consideration that we exhibited throughout the pandemic.

As COVID cases have dropped and related governmental restrictions have eased, we have been able to return our operations to "normal." We resumed funeral ceremonies in our chapels and face masks are now optional rather than government mandated. Hopefully we've turned the corner and will not see a return of these restrictions.

One lasting impact of the COVID-19 experience is our extended engagement with our families in need. This year Mount Sinai initiated it's *MS Cares* program. Every family receives a call 30 days after its service to check in and to determine if there is anything that Mount Sinai can do to support them. While relatively new, the program has been very well received by the community. Mount Sinai also implemented a new electronic customer survey system. Each client family receives an electronic survey 30 days after their service or pre-need property purchase. Responses to this survey rate Mount Sinai's service at least 8 of 10 and more than 90% would refer us to friends and family. Finally, Mount Sinai initiated grief counseling workshops to aid Mount Sinai and Sinai Temple families.

Virtually every operational metric at Mount Sinai showed improvement this year. Our mortuary market share increased from approximately 35% to approximately 40%. Much of this increase is attributable to a new website and updated digital marketing program. On average Mount Sinai receives 150 new calls per month from these initiatives. Year over year revenue increased approximately 4% with strong pre-need demand in both the Hollywood Hills and Simi Valley.

Strong financial results allowed Mount Sinai to continue to again grow its annual base-line support for Sinai Temple. This annual support is supplemented by contributions to a variety of Sinai Temple and Sinai Akiba programs and initiatives. Additionally, Mount Sinai expanded its long standing grants program, disbursing a total of almost \$300,000 to 32 separate Jewish organizations.

In order to maintain its ability to serve the Jewish community, Mount Sinai continued its active development program. This year we completed development of the Proverbs section in Hollywood Hills (nearly 1,000 new interment spaces) and completed the pre-construction design and permitting for the Meditations section (170 interment spaces). Construction of the Meditations area will begin this summer and be completed in the Winter of 2023. This summer we will also begin construction of the new "natural burial" area in Simi Valley. This section will incorporate "native" plant material and omit lawn type landscaping and paving. The section will include approximately 200 unique interment spaces, different from anything else available in the community.

Mount Sinai's success is largely due to the professionalism and commitment of the professional staff. Under the leadership of our General Manager, Mr. Randy Schwab, the staff works tirelessly to serve our families and to deliver the highest level of service in the industry.

I conclude this year by again acknowledging and expressing my personal appreciation for the men and women, all volunteers, who devote countless hours to serving on the Cemetery Management Committee and its various sub-committees. This year we saw Malcolm Cosgrove, Milton Hyman, Dan Merritt and Eric Swanson end their service on the Cemetery Management Committee. For Malcolm, Milt and Dan, this was the end to decades of dedicated service. At the same time, we welcomed Rob Galperson, David Kekst and Cary Lerman to the committee. All have already made noticeable contributions. Continuing their service with these recent additions are Linda Camras, Jim Delshad, Tom Flesh, Ira Friedman, Abner Goldstine, Robert Held, Thomas Lane, M. Milo Mandel, Kurt Smalberg, Perry Wallack, Joel Weinstein, Richard Weston and Sinai's President Michael Arnall. We would not achieve our continuing success without their active service, professional experience, and thoughtful judgment.
