Overarching Goals:

- To explore the connection of the Jewish People to the Land of Israel
- To demonstrate a deep commitment and love of Israel
- To understand the importance of Mitzvot in guiding our lives and to enrich the Jewish spirit of our heritage
- To enjoy and read basic Hebrew text smoothly and with accuracy

Challenge of the year: Be able to recite/sing Hatikvah - Practice at home!

Unit Goals: By the end of 4th grade (with regular attendance and participation) students will be able to: Hebrew ((עברית:))

- Correctly name 22 Hebrew letters and produce sounds of all 22 Hebrew letters, and all 9 vowels
- Accurately identify and pronounce all letter-vowel blends, and divide syllables appropriate and smoothly, visually and orally
- Read simple words accurately and read a sentence accurately, even with some hesitation

T'filah (תפילה) /Trope:

- Learn prayers for Havdallah and Friday evening service
- Sing the Saturday Morning Musaf Service with a basic idea of the meaning, melody, and choreography (focusing on *specific prayers:* Avot, Hatikvah)
- Recognize and sing Torah trope and apply to Shema and V'Ahavta with Cantor.
- Learn Torah and Tallit blessings.

Music:

• We focus on the songs of Israel, new and modern, and the Friday night liturgy. The students lead Kabbalat Shabbat in an Israelithemed service to conclude the year. Some of the songs we sing: Im Tirtzu, Yachad, One Day, Hashkiveinu and Ani V'atah

Holidays:

• Explore each holiday's connection to the Land of Israel and the Mitzvot performed on each holiday:

Rosh Hashanah/Yom Kippur: The book of Life, Returning to G-d and the notion of T'shuvah, Blowing of the Shofar, know holidays in order of how they occur during the year

Sukkot: Laws of building a kosher Sukkah, Mitzvot of Sukkot, harvest and pilgrimage of Jews in the desert

Simchat Torah: Why we finish reading the Torah and start reading it again, knowing the five books of Torah

Chanukah: The mitzvah/ritual of lighting the Chanukiah, historical background, the importance of being different

Tu B'Shevat: Biblical source, connection between trees and man's wisdom, the parable of *Honi Ha'meagel*, how humans are like trees **Purim:** Megillat Esther, characters of Purim, the Mitzvot on Purim, the concept of topsy turvy during the month of Adar, Mishloah Manot, Purim Shpiel, Hamantashen

Passover: The Passover story, the mitzvah of giving tzedakah to the poor, the mitzvah of serving all at the Seder, Ten Plagues.

Yom Ha Atzma'ut: What does it mean to have independence? Learn about Yerushalayim

Shavuot: Matan Torah, the 10 Commandments, eating dairy foods and the land of milk and honey

Bible:

- Define TaNaKh as the Hebrew Bible and identify its sections as: Torah, Nevi'im, and Ketuvim
- Use the "Child Bible" book and "Bible Games" workbook to reinforce learning about Bible stories

Jewish Life:

- Strengthen and build our community, embodying the value of K'lal Yisrael
- Recognize the mitzvah of Kashrut as emblematic of Jewish identity and practice
- Experience the Matzah factory, as it relates to our study of Passover, the Kashrut laws and the mitzvot of eating Matzah on Passover
- Havdallah Service: Explore the ritual practices and symbolisms associated with the three Havdallah objects (candle, wine, spices)

Jewish Values:

• Define *Kavod* as respect for one another

Israel:

- Appreciate the importance of Eretz Yisrael (the land of Israel), Medinat Yisrael (the State of Israel) and the meaning of independence
- Learn about the cities in Israel
