### Shoftim: No Going Back

The Prayer for Our Country that we recite every Shabbat morning concludes with a vision of peace foreseen by the prophet Isaiah: "Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore."

We pray that this vision become reality sooner than later. Until then, the reality of war is not lost on us, nor on the Israelites. As they prepare for the inevitable conflict that will come with their conquest of the Promised Land, the people are given their marching orders—or, rather, their stay-at-home orders. Should the time of battle arrive, "The officials shall address the troops, as follows: Is there anyone who has built a new house but has not dedicated it? Let him go back to his home, lest he die in battle and another dedicate it" (Deuteronomy 20:5).

The new homeowner, vintner, and bridegroom who have built but not dedicated, planted but not harvested, engaged but not married are all to return home from the battlefront to see through their commitments and tie up the loose ends that they had left behind.

As we approach 700 days of the war in Gaza still ongoing, I think about all those men and women—recent graduates, newlyweds, soon-to-be parents—for whom there is no going back home. Lives have been put on hold if not, tragically, cut short; dreams have been deferred, some to remain forever unfulfilled. The only direction is forward, yet even what lies ahead is far from certain.

And so we turn to prayer once again—and this time we needn't look further than the previous verse, which concludes the Prayer for the Soldiers of the IDF:

"For it is the LORD your God Who marches with you to do battle for you against your enemy, to bring you victory."

Shabbat shalom.
