Ki Tavo: Confession of the Good

The central prayer of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, is the *vidui*: the confession of our collective sins, from A to Z (or *alef* to *tav*), before God. Confession is a necessary step in the work of teshuvah, or repentance—better defined as "return"—that is our task in this season.

Parshat Ki Tavo presents a confession of an altogether different sort. This *vidui* is recited not on Yom Kippur but in the third year of the sabbatical cycle. After setting aside a tithe of their produce for the poor, every Israelite would make this declaration:

"I have given to the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow [and] have obeyed the LORD my God. I have done according to all You commanded me." (Deuteronomy 26:14)

This *vidui* is not a confession of sin but an affirmation of virtue. Perhaps the fact that we read about it in the days leading up to the Days of Awe is to serve as a reminder as we take stock of the life we lived in the past year: while it's important to admit what we did wrong, it's essential to acknowledge what we did right. Recognizing the good in ourselves is as conducive to our happiness as it is to our spiritual growth—and to our goal in these Holy Days of "returning" to who we really are and who we most want to be.
