## Vayelekh: Singing the Song of Torah

As he readies himself to take leave of the people and the world, Moses issues to the Israelites God's final commandment:

"Write down this song and teach it to the people of Israel; put it in their mouths, in order that this song may be My witness against the people of Israel." (Deuteronomy 31:19)

The "song" to which Moses refers is ambiguous. On its face, it is likely the poetic monologue that Moses recites in the very next parsha, Ha'azinu. But tradition interprets it to be the Torah in its entirety. Thus Maimonides, the great codifier of Jewish law, makes it incumbent on every Jew to write their own Torah scroll (or at least a part of one letter).

We might ask: What does it mean for the Torah to be a song? Perhaps that it should be chanted, as we do in any number of modes when we read from the Torah in community. Or maybe that it should be read not as prose but as poetry, as the love song of God for the Jewish people. Or, profounder still, that it be the lyrics to our lives—heard in our speech, performed through our deeds, played on the instruments of our hands and hearts.

However we understand the Torah as a song, one thing holds true: it's most beautiful when sung together in harmony.


