Bereshit: Seeing Is Deceiving

What was the sin of Adam and Eve? The answer seems apparent: they ate from the Tree of Knowledge of good and bad that they were explicitly commanded against. But a moment's reflection raises troublesome questions. Why was such knowledge verboten? Wouldn't God want humanity to discern good from bad? And if the human being had been created "in the image of God," much less expected to know that obeying God is the right thing to do, musn't he (and she) already have this knowledge in the first place?

Appearances can be deceiving—which is precisely the point. The story of the first sin is all about the world as seen by the eye. Eve had heard the world of God but is enticed by the sight of the Tree:

"When the woman saw that the tree was good for eating and a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable as a source of wisdom, she took of its fruit and ate." (Genesis 3:6)

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks explains that, where wisdom in the Western conception is a form of seeing (we have insight, we hold a view, we say "I see"), in Judaism it is a matter of listening. The word shema that we recite to ourselves twice each day means both hear and heed, listen and understand. Ironically, Adam and Eve "heard the sound of God moving about in the garden" and hid from God's sight. They confused hearing with seeing; they gained not forbidden knowledge, but the wrong kind of knowledge. That was their sin.

We too often make the same mistake. We judge with our eyes rather than our ears, without taking care to truly listen. As we begin the Torah anew, we have an opportunity—like the first man and woman—to hear God's words speaking to us. Shema, Yisrael: let us listen with open ears, minds, and hearts.
