Noach: From Calamity to Family

Benjamin Fingerhut, our beloved Musical Director here at Sinai Temple, taught our religious school students a delightful song in time for this week's parsha (to the tune of "The Ants Go Marching"):

The animals went in two by two,

the elephant and the kangaroo,

and they all went into the ark for to get out of the rain.

Aside from the odd British grammar, the song is true to the text: the animals (elephants and kangaroos included) did enter the ark in pairs, each set apart from the others I'minah "according to its kind." So too, Noah and his sons entered separately from their wives, at least according to rabbinic interpretation.

But that's now how they came out of the ark:

"Noah came out, together with his sons, his wife, and his sons' wives. Every animal, every creeping thing, and every bird, everything that stirs on earth came out of the ark by families." (Genesis 8:19)

Rashi and other biblical commentators take "families" to mean "species." I like to think that the choice of "family"—the first instance of the word, misphacha, in the Torah—is deliberate and significant.

All emerged closer from the ordeal they survived together. Wolf and lamb, leopard and kid, Noah, his sons, and their wives became family through shared struggle.

We too have become family through calamity. Our people has emerged not from forty days and nights but two years of trauma (following an attack which, if you recall, was named "Al-Aqsa Flood" by its perpetrators) as a closer, stronger, and more united family than we were before. Our challenge now is to maintain that familial bond in the weeks, months, and years ahead—to not fall back into the division and discord of I'minah.

As Rabbi Wolpe urged us in his most recent sermon, may we be worthy of the task that is the promise of this moment.
