Lech Lecha: Of Stars and Dust

"We are made of star-stuff," said the great (Jewish) astronomer Carl Sagan. The same elements forming the stardust of outer space form the cells of our bodies, so that—quite literally—"the cosmos is within us."

The Torah made the same observation of our people, albeit metaphorically. God announces to our forefather Abraham (then Abram) that his offspring will be k'afar ha-aretz — "as the dust of the earth," so ubiquitous as to be uncountable. Later, God bids Abram to number the stars in the heavens; as innumerable as they are, "so shall your offspring be." The Jewish people, God promises, will be as universal as stars and dust—if not stardust.

But rabbis throughout history, and history itself, have read these comparisons differently. Jews, at one-fifth of one percent of the world's population, are far from countless, nor has our growth ever met with worldwide acclaim. The medieval Italian commentator Ovadia Sforno likens the Jews to dust in that both are trodden over. In a similar vein, the Hasidic Rabbi Chaim of Sanz points out that the Jews, like stars, appear minuscule from afar. Yet dust outlasts the greatest empires, as the Jews have outlasted all of their oppressors; and stars, though small from an earthly perspective, are vast in the heavens' eyes, as Jews are vast in Heaven's eyes. We are, in spirit if not body, the stuff of stars and of dust.

"We are a way," concludes Carl Sagan, "for the universe to know itself." Though he spoke of humanity, such is true of his own tribe. We, the Jewish people, are a way for the universe to know itself: so long as we are around, it knows it's not going anywhere.
