Vayigash: To Be a Guarantee

The reconciliation of Joseph with his brothers is the happy ending to a family's story of strife, loss, and grief. At the same time, it's the resolution to a history of sibling rivalry—and intergenerational trauma—going all the way back to the very beginning. Cain's infamous question after murdering Abel, "Am I my brother's keeper?", is answered in the affirmative by Judah on behalf of Benjamin: "For your servant has pledged himself (arav) for the boy to my father, saying, 'If I do not bring him back to you, I shall stand guilty before my father forever." (Genesis 44:32)

The word arav literally means "guarantee." Judah, in pleading with Joseph to exchange his own servitude for Benjamin's freedom, acts as his younger brother's guarantor. The Lubavitcher rebbe, Menachem Mendel Schneerson, identifies this as the origin of the maxim *kol Yisrael arevim zeh bazeh* "all Jews are guarantors for one another." It is from Judah that we get our name and our most important value as a people: mutual responsibility.

But there is more to the word *arav*. It also means "mixture," as in the "mixed multitude (*erev rav*)" that went up with the Israelites out of Egypt. The Jewish people is a diverse assortment of personalities, practices, and politics. Yet we are a unity within this diversity. We share something much deeper in common than the surface features on which we differ.

This deeper something is the source of the third sense of *arav*: "sweetness." It is the care and concern we have for each other that sweetens what would otherwise be a bitter tale of exile, persecution, and discrimination.

May we, like Judah before us, be guided by an ethic of *arevut*: taking responsibility for our brothers (and sisters), appreciating their uniqueness, and sweetening our own lives in loving them.
