

Bo: From Doorpost to Signpost

Why do we hang a mezuzah on our doorframe (if not that the Torah tells us to)? Some believe that it guards our home with Divine protection. God willing, it does—but surely, God doesn’t need a piece of parchment to make it so.

The same question can be asked of our Israelite forebears. Why did they mark their *mezuzot*—that is, their “doorposts”—with the blood of the Paschal lamb? Did God really need the indication to know whom to spare the plague of the firstborn? The Torah suggests otherwise:

“And the blood on the houses where you are staying shall be a sign *for you*: when I see the blood I will pass over you, so that no plague will destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.” (Exodus 12:13)

The blood on the house was not a sign for God but for those living in it. Explains the medieval commentator Rabeinu Bahya, in smearing their doorposts with the blood of a lamb—worshipped as an Egyptian deity—the Israelites proved themselves to live with faith and without fear. God’s protection was the result of their own fortitude.

So it is in our times. When we affix a *mezuzah* to our doorframe, we affirm our faithfulness as a people and our fearlessness in a world that too often threatens us. It is a sign *for us*, that we are willing to stand behind our values and against the plagues of ignorance and hate. That commitment on our part is the one sign that God truly needs.
